Katrina

My *To Do* list almost always includes the instruction to myself to "clean up piles." Stacks of paper clutter my home and my office. If I were brave, I'd put them all in the recycling bin. I'm not that brave, so I try to weed through the piles periodically, as I did this year in September.

One pile was tucked way under my desk. I knew it included essays by Robert Fisk (for the British paper, the Independent) on the invasion of Iraq in 2003, but had no idea why the pile was six inches high. Upon inspection, I discovered I had five years worth of a nightmarish tale, which began with the election and inauguration of Bush II. Then came 9/11, the tragedy and the unbelievably vengeful response by the Bush administration that "We're going to get 'em." Then articles about the hideous treatment of the Palestinians by the Israelis: house demolitions and increased numbers of Israeli settlements. Then the invasion of Afghanistan. (We were chasing Bin Laden whom we never caught. Right?) Then the war in Iraq. And finally the devastation of Hurricane Katrina, to which the federal government responded so slowly and so badly that we were all embarrassed.

Taken together, it sure looks like we are better at creating and supporting disasters than responding to them. (It was bad enough when we were wreaking havoc thousands of miles away, but when we saw our ineptitude a few hundred miles away, it was downright embarrassing.)

So why was our authorized public response to Katrina so inadequate? Pick your reasons. The president was on vacation. Some political crony, who knew little about management and nothing of emergency management, was in charge of FEMA. Our money, helicopters, and National Guards were in Iraq. And sadly, we had helped to finance the war in Iraq by cutting the budget for levee maintenance and repair in New Orleans.

I once knew a woman who was the head of civil defense for a medium-sized city. She was constantly in hot water with her superiors because when they asked her to turn in her plans to protect all the people of her municipality from nuclear war, her reports always said that same thing. "It can't be done." Oh. Someone making sense and completely screwing up the system.

Perhaps we don't actually know how to protect or evacuate millions of people. We've had two opportunities recently (New Orleans and Houston) and neither went all that well.

Clearly it is going to take a lot of money to repair New Orleans and the coast of Mississippi, Louisiana, and Texas. We don't have a lot of extra cash because the war in Iraq is costing buckets of money. Based on congressional appropriations, we will spend \$204.6 trillion on the war by the end of 2005. (Where are those rabid balanced budget fanatics Gramm and Rudman when we need them?)

In the face of a national emergency, I've come to worry that the right will capitalize on the situation and advance their agenda. Sure enough, conservatives in

We need a few more hours of filming and a lot more fundraising.

Essay Contest

The Resource Center for Women and Ministry in the South is sponsoring its third essay contest. Women eighteen years of age and older may submit previously unpublished nonfiction essays of 1400 words or less.

Essays should focus on or exemplify feminist perspectives on spirituality and daily life. We want women to write about their lives, grace, how they experience God, or how they make it through the hard places. No sermons, please.

Prizes will be \$500 for first place, \$300 for second place, and \$200 for third place. The winning essay will be published in the RCWMS newsletter, South of the Garden, in March 2006. Winners will be notified by mail.

The limit is two essays per person. Submit four double-spaced copies of each essay. Do not put your name on the essay. Attach a cover letter with the title of the essay(s), your name, address, phone number, and email. Submissions must be postmarked by November 15, 2005. No email submissions are permitted. 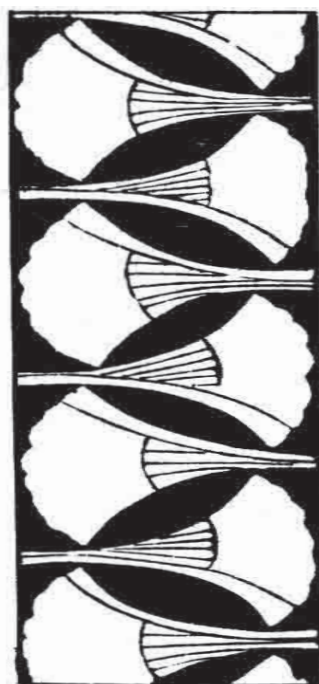

Katrina...

Congress have a plan they call Operation Offset for saving money and financing the hurricane recovery. It includes eliminating the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, federal loans for graduate students, Title X family planning services for teens, the National Endowment for the Art and the National Endowment for the Humanities. The Heritage Foundation has already publicly applauded the plan.

So what we see is that what America is good at is going halfway around the world to make false claims against other governments, to start full-scale wars in the name of freedom that are really about securing future oil supplies so that back home we can drive around in SUVs and leave our most vulnerable citizens (poor, elderly, sick) to drown in a leaky city.

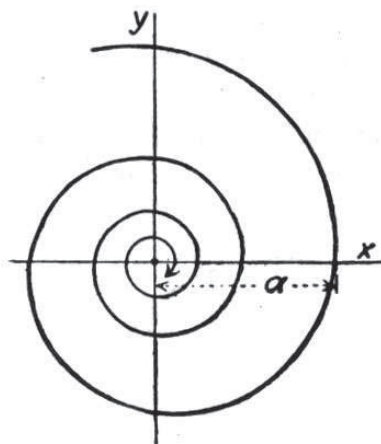
Meanwhile, corporations that have been getting rich from "rebuilding" Iraq are signing huge government contracts to "rebuild" New Orleans and hoping that the poor who were finally evacuated from the Superdome won't manage to return.

All is not bleak. While heads of state fly around making ceremonial visits to disaster areas and federal agencies bump into one another like the Three Stooges, kind, generous Americans have headed to the disaster areas to help, cooked meals, collected and delivered supplies, opened their homes or community buildings to refugees, adopted whole families and sent contributions to agencies that can help. We would like to recommend one such organization on the ground in the Mississippi for your consideration, Moore Community House.

Carol Burnett is the director of Moore Community House, which serves the children of poor and low income families in Biloxi and served as the headquarters for the Mississippi Low Income Child Care Initiative and the Gulf Coast Child Care Resource and Referral Agency. She and her husband Jeremy Eisler, Director of Litigation for the South Mississippi Legal Services Corporation, are working to rebuild Moore Community House and to aid children and their families post-Katrina.

A few days after the hurricane hit, Carol, a United Methodist Minister whose own home in Ocean Springs was reduced to a concrete slab, wrote to friends asking for help for those she serves. "Katrina destroyed Biloxi, home to Moore Community House. We need your help to rebuild and re-open so we can help our community with the long-term recovery process."
